With that in mind, we are pleased to present this brief profile of our impact on the New River Valley.


Community Need

The NRVCS service region includes more than 175,824 people. The table below illustrates the prevalence of significant behavioral health conditions among New River Valley residents.

Community Investment

NRVCS' work in the community is supported through a combination of public and private sector funding. In Fiscal Year 2013, funding for the agency totaled nearly \$40 million. It is worth noting that - for every \$1 of direct local funding to NRVCS, almost \$78 was generated from other sources. Fee revenue came primarily from Medicaid.

NRVCS provides services for mental illness, intellectual disabilities and substance use disorders. We also offer emergency services for individuals in crisis, early intervention services for infants and toddlers, and prevention services designed to reduce risk and promote wellness.

Community Outcomes

The individual value of NRVCS services can be defined in terms of consumers' improvements in health, wellness, recovery, productivity, and independence. This value accrues to the community in the form of increased productivity in school and work, reduced community costs for other services, and enhanced quality of life.

Infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families	 Require fewer special education services and some types of medical services, resulting in long-term cost savings in decreased grade repetition, reduced special education spending, lower healthcare costs, increased tax revenues, and lower juvenile justice costs.
Children, youth, and families	✓ Prevent risky behavior, including substance and alcohol use and the associated costs of treatment.
Adults and youth with serious mental illness	 Manage their condition and live in community settings at far less cost than hospitals, jails, or homeless shelters.
Adults and youth with severe substance use disorders	 Recover to clean and sober lives, employment, supporting their families, and mentoring others out of the addiction cycle.

RADFORD TRANSIT

Provides accessibility and mobility to residents of Radford, Radford University students, and surrounding communities - including links to Pulaski, Christiansburg, Blacksburg and beyond. Provided over 325,000 passenger trips in FY 2013. Stimulates the economy of the entire NRV by providing access to jobs, retail, education, medical services, and promoting independence and mobility for all.

Community Crisis Innovations

NRVCS works in partnership with consumers and other community agencies to implement innovative and evidence-based programs and services, including those targeted to assist individuals in crisis. All of these programs and services are designed to maximize value for both the individual consumer and the community.

Program	Innovation
New Horizons Crisis Stabilization	Offers a secure, therapeutic, home-like alternative to hospitalization for adults in psychiatric crisis. A team of doctors, clinicians, nurses, and direct care staff work together to develop an individualized treatment with each client that allows for immediate stabilization and a quick return home.
REACH (Regional, Educational, Assessment, Crisis Services, Habilitation)	Supports individuals across Southwest Virginia, providing a short-term therapeutic group home and community-based crisis prevention, intervention, and stabilization for individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities and behavioral health needs.
Crisis Intervention Services (for children & adults)	Provides a mobile crisis team approach to assess and treat the psychiatric needs of children and their families, as well as adults. Short-term clinical services are provided in multiple locations including home, school, clinic, or other community locations. The goal is to stabilize psychiatric or behavioral issues to prevent out-of-home or out-of-community placements.
Raft Crisis Hotline	Staffed by volunteers with specialized training in phone based crisis response, the RAFT Hotline offers callers supportive counseling and triage for an Access clinician 24 hours a day/seven days a week.
Crisis Intervention Team Assessment Center (CITAC)	For individuals under an emergency custody order (ECO) with participating law enforcement agencies, the assessment center provides the capacity for the immediate transfer of custody in order to conduct a more client-centered assessment/pre-screening and subsequently free-up local policing resources.
Emergency Services	Designed to provide rapid intervention to individuals experiencing a significant crisis that has impacted their emotional or psychological functioning. Services may include counseling visits, case management services, and referral to community supports, and supportive phone contacts. The goal of services is to quickly stabilize symptoms by maximizing available supports and resources. Allows clinicians to provide counseling several times per week or as needed, based on the presenting difficulty.



Community Economic Impact

In addition to its role as a community service provider, NRVCS is a significant contributor to the local economy. During Fiscal Year 2013, the agency provided 712 jobs, paid \$29 million in employee compensation, and spent \$39.9 million in total output/expenditures.

Using standard methods of economic impact analysis, it is estimated that these direct outputs may have supported 392 additional jobs in the community, along with \$13.6 million in additional labor income, and \$25.9 million in additional economic output.2
