

Fatal Five Focus: Sepsis

Cultural Diversity and Caregiving

Studies show that ethnic minority caregivers provide more care than their White counterparts and report worse physical health than White caregivers (McCann et al, 2000).

Several studies have found that African-American caregivers experience less stress and depression and garner greater rewards from caregiving than White caregivers (Cuellar, 2002; Haley et al, 2004).

Hispanic and Asian American caregivers, however, exhibit more depression than white caregivers (Haley et al, 2004).

The "Fatal Five" are conditions that are linked to preventable deaths of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. They include aspiration, gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), bowel obstruction, seizures, and dehydration. Recently, another condition has been recognized and the fatal five have been renamed "Fatal Five +" to include sepsis.

What is sepsis?

Sepsis is the body's response to widespread infection. It leads to organ and tissue death and is life threatening. Sepsis is caused by an isolated infection that is untreated or not responding to treatment and spreads quickly. Infections often linked to sepsis include those originating in the lungs (pneumonia), urinary tract (UTIs), wounds, and intestines.

You Are Invited to Participate in a Focus Group Assessing Perspectives of Health Monitoring for Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) **Study:** Exploring the Feasibility of Non-Invasive Technology to Monitor and Predict Self-Injurious Behavior (SIB) in Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

Virginia Tech and the University of Virginia are conducting a study to assess perspectives of non-invasive health monitoring technology for self-injurious behavior in people with autism spectrum disorders (ASD). They are enrolling parents, guardians, and educators of 2-30 year olds with an ASD diagnosis who also engage in self-injurious behavior. Enrollment is now open.

The study involves discussing needs and challenges associated with self-injurious behavior, either in person or over the phone. There is no cost for this program and participants will receive payments for completing the session.


