



ASD in the Workplace Study

Researchers at Virginia Tech are currently conducting a study on experiences of individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) in the workplace. We are looking for individuals age 16 and older with ASD who have applied for or held a job to participate in a one-time focus group discussion.

Participants: Individuals with autism age 16 to 60 who have applied for and/or held a job.

Method: One-time focus group visit to the Virginia Tech campus in Blacksburg

Measures: Individuals will participate in a group discussion about their work experiences. The discussion will be audio-taped.

Time: 60-90 minutes, depending on the response of the group

Compensation: \$25 gift card

Social Motivation Study

We want to hear about your social preferences and behavior!

We are conducting a research study to get more information from children and teenagers on their social preferences. Specifically, we are trying to create and test-out an interview which will assess how people feel about making friends, interacting with other people, and engaging in social settings.

Participation involves both a parent and child to complete a one-session assessment session at the Virginia Tech Child Study Center. During this one session appointment (not to exceed 3 hours), you will be asked to communicate your likes, dislikes, and social behaviors through a variety of assessment measures. We are enrolling young people with Autism Spectrum Disorder who are between the ages of 8-17 and a parent.

Participants will receive a total of \$75 for their time (\$25 for the child participant, \$50 for the adult participant). Additionally, parents will receive a brief session summary detailing assessment findings related to social motivation.


