Experience Autism

A family shared that one of the most helpful experiences they were provided as "neuro-typical" parents of a child with autism were sensory scenarios that recreated a distracted, overstimulated, noisy, bright, or surprised environment.

Experiencing a small part of what their child went through everyday helped them learn ways to be inclusive, culturally sensitive, and utilize personcentered strategies.




