


Welcome back! Spring is here, along with our May newsletter!



REACH utilizes a team approach to provide: clinical assessment; crisis prevention, stabilization, and intervention planning and education; community and home based crisis intervention and stabilization to both adults and children diagnosed with an intellectual or developmental disability and a co-occurring mental health diagnosis or challenging behavior; and facility-based, therapeutic, emergency, and limited planned stays for individuals 18 and over.

The goal of REACH is to stabilize current or emerging crisis events and strengthen the individuals' support systems. With intervention and training, REACH increases capacity to support individuals served and promote person-centered positive outcomes. REACH serves adults and children with an intellectual or developmental disability and a co-occurring mental health diagnosis or challenging behavior that is affecting their quality of life.

Spotlight on...

The Shenandoah Autism Center

What is the Shenandoah Autism Center (SAC)?

Shenandoah Autism Center is a regional private day school for students with Autism located in the Clifton Forge area of the Alleghany Highlands. Shenandoah Autism Center was incorporated February 9, 1999 in the Shenandoah Valley by a small group of parents and professionals dedicated to children with autism. SAC relocated due to the high need for services and has been settled in Clifton Forge, Virginia since 2002. Shenandoah Autism Center is licensed by the Virginia Department of Education.

Shenandoah Autism Center's mission is to provide support, information, and appropriate education to children with Autism and their families.

Who does the SAC serve?

All students served have Autism while many have additional disabilities. The Center currently serves twelve students ranging in age from 4 to 22 years placed by three different school divisions.

What makes the SAC unique?

Each student receives one on one support by a paraprofessional who is highly trained in the techniques of Applied Behavior Analyst, under the direction of an Education Coordinator who is a Board Certified Behavior Analyst and licensed as a teacher and administer through the Virginia Department of Education. Student programs emphasize a strong focus on communication, socialization, and adaptive living skills.

Each student's program is personalized and very unique. Some of the more recent innovative programs that have been developed to use with students include using the Pro-Lo-Quo to Go picture to speak program on the I-pad with nonverbal students of various ages. Students use the program for greetings, requesting, and conversation. A tactile schedule and identification system has been developed for a student who is blind and has Autism. SAC has also paired with local businesses to give students vocational skills. These have recently included a pet groomer, landscaping store, and church.

You can receive a comprehensive ASD assessment battery through VTCAR via participation in the VTCAR Assessment Database. In this case, you would complete ASD measures and assessments and receive a a diagnostic clinical summary. Following your assessment, if additional assessments or evaluations are necessary you would then receive a priority referral for a full evaluation at the Child Assessment Clinic (CAC), Virginia Tech Autism Clinic (VTAC), or the Psychological Services Center (PSC).
