REACH utilizes a team approach to provide: clinical assessment; crisis prevention, stabilization, and intervention planning and education; community and home based crisis intervention and stabilization to both adults and children diagnosed with an intellectual or developmental disability and a co-occurring mental health diagnosis or challenging behavior; and facility-based, therapeutic, emergency, and limited planned stays for individuals 18 and over.

The goal of REACH is to stabilize current or emerging crisis events and strengthen the individuals' support systems. With intervention and training, REACH increases capacity to support individuals served and promote person-centered positive outcomes. REACH serves adults and children with an intellectual or developmental disability and a co-occurring mental health diagnosis or challenging behavior that is affecting their quality of life.

REACH Region III Updates

REACH Crisis Therapeutic House Updates

We have added a 7th bed to the REACH CTH! This is an approved, temporary stop-gap to meet the need for those individuals experiencing displacement from current housing. Use of this bed is based on support needs that the current system of providers is unable to meet. We are exploring further expansion opportunities.

- 5 Prevention Stay
- 2 Step Downs from Psychiatric Hospitals

- 128 Active cases (those receiving crisis or prevention services)

Children's Services

Since beginning Children's Crisis Services in October 2014, REACH has served over 20 families throughout the Region. Although REACH serves youth of all ages, current trends in referrals include transition age youth who are pre-teens or teenagers. REACH Children's Crisis Services continues to grow, and we are in the process of hiring additional children's staff to support the needs throughout the Region -- be on the lookout for new faces!

Recent REACH Training Recap

Have you ever felt frustrated when communicating a medical problem? Try this technique from the recent REACH training, "Recognizing Medical Causes for Behavior."

Report the medical problem with "SBON!" SBON is a four step process to help organize your thoughts and facilitate clear and concise communication.

- Step 1: Report the <u>situation</u> **(S)** by stating what is happening right now. "Carrie is experiencing a change in behavior. She is aggressive toward herself and others."
- Step 2: Provide <u>background</u> (B) information. "Yesterday morning, Carrie started biting her hand and other people when they are close to her. The behavior has worsened in the past 24 hours and she doesn't have a history of this that I am aware of."
- Step 3: Describe factual and measurable <u>observations</u> (O). "Carrie has a red and swollen area forming on her hand, about the size of a golf ball. There are no changes in her eating, sleeping, or bowel patterns, but starting yesterday, her urine has a strong odor."
- Step 4: Request help in moving on to the <u>next step</u> **(N)**. "I need you to tell me what the next step is to keep Carrie and others safe."

This training, sponsored by REACH Region III and Virginia DBHDS, was open to residential providers, day support providers, and family members. 123 people attended across two locations.
