



Skin Breakdown

Did you know that the skin is the largest organ in the body? Skin acts as a protective barrier against infection and trauma and helps regulate temperature variations from the environment. It maintains hydration and is associated with overall health and well-being.

Promoting skin integrity and preventing skin breakdown is paramount in maintaining quality of life.

Risk factors

Risk factors for skin breakdown include age, lack of sensory perception, weight loss, immobility, poor nutrition and hydration, excess moisture and/or dryness, bowel and urinary incontinence, medical conditions, and exposure to shear and/or friction. Individuals with the following conditions/in the following situations are at risk for developing skin breakdown:

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- Poor nutrition and dehydration
- Incontinence
- Generalized weakness or weakness on one side of the body
- · Paralysis, sedation, or coma
- Non-ambulatory (utilize wheelchair for mobility)
- · Post-surgical procedure

Complications

Complications from skin breakdown include pressure ulcers (pressure sores, decubitus ulcers), cellulitis (skin infection), bone and joint infections, and sepsis (life-threatening blood infection).

Signs and symptoms

Pressure sores are categorized in stages:

 Stage 1 – skin appears red and does not blanch (turn white) when touched. Site may be tender, but skin is not broken (i.e. intact blister from poor fitting shoes).

Parent Survey

The Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) is asking for your assistance in promoting the completion of the survey by each of your families who has a child with a disability and is provided special education services through an individualized education program (IEP) by whatever means you deem appropriate. Families who have more than one child receiving special education services should be afforded the opportunity to complete a survey for each of their children.

Collection of survey data may begin immediately upon receipt of the printed survey and the opening of the online survey. This year's timeline for completion and submission of survey responses, in any modality, is set at September 30, 2018. The VDOE has renewed its goal of increasing the number of survey responses we receive. As such, during the collection window, the VDOE will engage in a number of technical assistance outreach efforts to parents and parent organizations to ensure that every parent of a child with a disability in the Commonwealth has the opportunity to participate in the survey.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment toward ensuring that we involve each parent in his/her child's special education program. 
